Road Safety

At Rosebery Primary School we want to keep our children safe. Teachers talk to students about Road Safety and we ask parents to take time to teach Road Safety too. Children are not always able to be responsible for their own safety when crossing roads. This is because they have:

- under-developed peripheral vision and directional hearing
- difficulty judging speed and distance of vehicles
- not developed the skills to search the traffic environment
- a tendency to be easily distracted and are unpredictable
- a smaller stature making it difficult for drivers to see them.

It is important that adults supervise children when crossing roads and talk about where it is safer to cross.

Here are some important points to remember when teaching your child how to cross the road.

- ✓ The safest places to cross are at marked crossings, traffic lights, median islands or where there is a traffic attendant.
- ✓ If there is no special crossing, it is safer to cross on a straight flat section of road.
- ✓ When crossing at an intersection, stand where all traffic can be seen and where drivers can see you and your child. Check for turning traffic before crossing.
- ✓ Remind your child it is unsafe to cross between parked cars. However, when this is the only choice, your child should select a gap between two cars which have no drivers and walk to the outside corners of the car. They should stop where they can see traffic and be seen by traffic (i.e. in line with the outside edge of the cars) before using the safe crossing procedure.

Please remind your children to **use the marked school crossings around Rosebery Primary School**, whether they are walking or riding a bike or scooter.



Kagan Cooperative Learning

This is the pedagogical approach that underpins Rosebery Primary School's philosophy of inclusive learning. The Kagan structures focus on teamwork and shared accountability, and when skilfully administered, allows students to take real responsibility for their learning and the learning of those around them, keeping them focused on learning in a fun but deeply engaging manner.

Kagan Cooperative Learning is based on the creation, analysis and systematic application of structures, or content-free ways of organising social interaction in the classroom. Structures usually involve a series of steps, with prescribed behaviour at each step. All Kagan structures are designed to maximize four attributes among students:

Positive interdependence: 'Is a gain for one, a gain for all?'

Individual accountability: 'Is there required individual performance?'

Equal Participation: 'How equal is the participation?'

Simultaneous Interaction: 'What percent of students are overtly active at any one time?'






House Points Tally


National Simultaneous Storytime

Inquiry Unit into “Who We Are”

During our Semester 1 Inquiry Unit into “Who We Are”, students (in groups of 3) investigated the qualities of a person they admired—their hero! They researched their hero's skills, knowledge and personal attributes, made a hero doll and then made oral presentations to the class. A fun and productive unit of work.



Math and Science Integration

The students investigated shadows as part of their Science unit “Night and Day.” Before measuring, students made predictions as to when shadows would be longest. They then measured the length of their shadows at a 3 times during the day and discussed results and conclusions reached.



Persuasive Writing with a Partner

Partners choose a topic, brainstormed their ideas and wrote their persuasive writing piece—one partner writing while the other assisted with ideas, spelling and punctuation and the other dictating sentences.



Cultural Group Week 3 & 4

In Week 3 of Culture Program, students learned how to make string from tree branches. The types of trees they used were native hibiscus, which is found around the coastal areas of Larrakia country, and the stringy bark tree. This skill required a lot of patience, coordination and persistence but the boys enjoyed watching the transformation process take place. Larrakia people use string for a variety of purposes including making fish traps, tying branches together and making ceremonial costume.



In Week 4, students painted a set of clapsticks each. Trent generously gifted the boys their own set of handmade clapsticks which they painted in their own way. They used a variety of brushes and tools to create lines and dots in the traditional colours of black, white, brown and ochre. This activity was very therapeutic and the boys look forward to painting their own PVC Didgeridoo's next week. In our sessions, the boys all talk and share knowledge and stories and enjoy sharing what they have learned with their classes.
